This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	44%	This year group should have had swimming in each year during their time at Trosnant. However, they missed their swimming when in year 3 due to Covid 19. The year 6 swimming lessons have been disrupted this term leading to less taught sessions than in previous years. The school has adapted provision for next year to ensure priority in the Autumn term is given to Y6. Y5 will also have a term of taught sessions in the Spring term.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	20%	A number of our children achieved 25 metres but maybe in only one stroke and not always an effective stroke.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	20%
